

Versace. Sit at a sidewalk table with a glass of wine and enjoy live music on the hotel's porch. For a little flash and glamour, stroll to Collins Avenue to tour the lobbies and bars of classic Miami hotels like the Delano, the Stork Club, and the Fontainebleau.

SATURDAY

5 Art Deco Town 10 a.m.

Miami's sizable Art Deco district has hundreds of buildings from the 1920s through the 1940s, many of them prime examples of the era's favorite architectural style. Think pastel hues and architecture evocative of ships. The **Art Deco Welcome Center** (1001 Ocean Drive; 305-672-2014; mdpl.org) offers guided 10:30 a.m.



tours that include stops at hotels, restaurants, and other commercial buildings. If you'd prefer to go on your own, rent an audio tour at the center. Either way, make a reservation in advance.

6 Pop Over for Brunch Noon

Extend your trip back in time with brunch at the Betsy Hotel (1440 Ocean Drive; 305-531-6100; thebetsyhotel.com), a renovated structure that captures an old-fashioned charm that flappers could appreciate. Head to the hotel's LT Steak & Seafood (305-673-0044; \$\$\$). As you consume a popover Benedict (a twist on eggs Benedict) or multigrain pancakes with rum-caramel banana flambé and almond butter, scan the crowd, an interesting mix of the wealthy and established with the young and scantily dressed.

7 Sun, Surf, Sand 1 p.m.

The afternoon is for relaxing amid miles of white sand. The free public sands generally defined as South Beach stretch from Ocean Drive and Fifth
